Excerpt from Soils of Pender County, North Carolina, 1910: A Preliminary Report The bottom lands in the valleys of some of these streams are only a few feet above sea level. A conspicuous feature of the county is seen in the numerous bays, or wet areas, which usually support a dense growth of shrubbery and trees, as bay, pine, black gum, sweet gum, and gallberry bushes. The better drained lands support a growth of pine, with a sprinkling of oak and hickory and an undergrowth of wire grass and huckleberries; while the poorly drained soils support mainly pine and a thick undergrowth of gallberry bushes, bay, pitcher plants, etc. Probably less than a third of Fender County is under cultivation. The population of the county in 1900 was 13,381. There has been some increase, especially in the towns, but there are a number of rural districts so sparsely settled that agricultural development has not made anything like the headway warranted by the productivity of the soils. The white population is largely of English and Scotch descent. There...
